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Historical Comparison

Democratic Primary

This was a Democratic Primary Election for the office of County Board (1 seat). Turnout was similar to the Special Election for County Board held on July 7, 2020. No Excuse Absentee Voting was introduced in November 2020 and the Covid-19 Pandemic led to an increase in Absentee Mail Ballot applications in 2020.

Republican Primary


This was a Republican Primary for the office of U.S. Senate. Turnout was similar to the previous Republican Primaries for U.S. Senate in 2020 and 2012. No Excuse Absentee Voting was introduced in November 2020 and the Covid-19 Pandemic led to an increase in Absentee Mail Ballot applications in 2020.


Democratic - Voter Turnout & Method

Early Voting Site Turnout



Two additional satellite Early Voting sites were opened at Madison and Walter Reed Community Centers on June 8, 11, 13, and 15.



Democratic Primary

10,184 Democratic Primary ballots were mailed to voters who requested one. This includes reissued ballots (ballots reported lost or spoiled) and email ballots (UOCAVA and ADA voters).
9,126 ballots mailed were from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List.

4,790 ballots were counted. 112 ballots were exchanged so that the voter could vote in person. 32 ballots were rejected. 93% of ballots returned were mailed from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List.

Republican Primary

1,425 Republican Primary ballots were mailed to voters who requested one. This includes reissued ballots (ballots reported lost or spoiled) and email ballots (UOCAVA and ADA voters). 1,242 ballots mailed were from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List.

589 ballots were counted. 18 ballots were exchanged so that the voter could vote in person. 4 ballots were rejected. 90% of ballots returned were mailed from the Permanent Absentee (PAB) List.

UOCAVA


UOCAVA is a special category of mail ballot voters. These are voters who are either in the military or reside overseas. These voters are eligible to receive their ballots by mail or email.

ADA


In August 2020, Virginia entered into an agreement to allow print disabled voters the ability to use the online tool for UOCAVA voters to mark their ballots from home.


Return Method

Nine 24-hour drop boxes were available from May 6 to June 18, 2024. Drop boxes were also available at the 3 Early Voting and 54 Polling Locations while the sites were open for in-person delivery. 1,243 ballots were returned using a drop box. This includes 276 returned to polling places on Election Day and 77 returned at Early Voting sites.

Mail Ballots Exchanged for In-Person Ballots

A total of 199 voters who requested a Democratic Primary mail ballot and 30 voters who requested a Republican Primary mail ballot chose to vote in-person. Voters had several options to change from a mail ballot to an in-person ballot. Voters could exchange their mail ballot for an in-person ballot at Early Voting and sign a statement authorizing our office to reissue a ballot during. On Election Day voters could cast a provisional ballot at their assigned precinct.

Issues or Rejections

Mail ballots can be 'rejected' in two ways - by the scanner when being tallied or a material omission. A material omission occurs when something is missing on a ballot's return materials, such as the voter's signature.

Voters were permitted to "cure" or correct omissions on their mail ballots up until noon the Friday after the election. 40 of the voters contacted for the Democratic Primary cured their ballots. 3 of the voters contacted for the Republican Primary cured their ballots.

Ballots that are rejected by the scanner are hand counted by a team of election officers. If voter intent can be determined, these ballots are counted.


Voter Wait Times

Election Officers

307 Election Officers worked on Election Day. Election Officer training was offered both inperson and online. The majority of Election Officers attended in-person training.

In addition to online and in-person training, Equipment Lab was also offered so Election Officers could have hands-on training with voting equipment. 23% of Election Officers attended Equipment lab, in addition to attending online or in-person training.



Provisional Data

A provisional ballot is issued when a voter's eligibility cannot be determined on Election Day.



Same Day Registration


Voters who miss the registration deadline may register or update their name and address in-person during Early Voting or at their polling place on Election Day. All new registrations received after the deadline vote a provisional ballot. Same Day Registration began on May 29, 2024.

Staffing
